

An Open Letter to Our Readers: **Newspaper Format or E-Mail For Your Tattle Tailer?**

Because our Governor and other district leaders are concerned about rising postal costs, two meetings have been held recently to come up with a consensus on the question, "Do we want to continue the Tattle Tailer in its present form of the past 25 years as a newspaper format, mailing it to each member, or do we want the information to reach our Lions, Lionesses and Leos in District 24-K online in the form of e-mails?" The committee has various views, but do agree on one thing, we need to save monev

This district is the only one in Pennsylvania to have a newspaper with which to communicate to all the members what is going on in the district and among our clubs. As your editor, I'm proud of that. It was an idea that originated with the late PDG Curtis Krause, and I've been happy to carry it on all these years.

Thanks to the Governors' Projects, the Individual and Club Boosters, and the ads that have been placed, we have managed to stay in the black, and we are grateful for this support. The Lions and Lionesses of our district have been great!

We can cut down on some mailing costs by eliminating sending the Tattle Tailer to past district governors of past State Councils, past convention speakers, and indeed the state office and Lions Clubs International. That would be minimal, but a saving of 29-cents per copy. The bulk of the mailing costs is to our own Lions, Lionesses and Leos in this district, and that would remain at a cost of 23-cents each. The printing cost would probably be close to what it is now, even if the number of papers printed goes down from 1,300 to 1,100.

I, personally, am not in favor of e-mail, Facebook or twitter. My computer doesn't have it, and I don't ever want it. From what I've seen where messages are sent to numerous individuals, ALL those e-mail addresses are contained in one huge paragraph. That's a waste of paper right there, and cuts down on the space for the message.

We are asking for our readers' opinion. Do you want to keep the newspaper format or to go online? With your financial support as it has been, we can continue publishing a newspaper for all our members in District 14-K.

The next meeting to discuss the pros and cons of this question will be held just before the Executive Committee meets on August 13. Hopéfully, with your response, the committee will be guided in making a decision.
