Convention Registration Forms Going in Mail on January 7th

The committee planning the 2017 convention of District 14-K met on Monday, November 14 at Christ U.C.C. Church, Airport Road, as they continue planning for the Saturday and Sunday, March 25 and March 26 District 14-K Convention at the Holiday Inn Conference Center near Breinigsville.

They worked on finalizing changes to the convention registration forms, which will be sent out on Saturday morning, January 7. The return address lists the new chairpersons, PDG Linwood Gehris and his wife, Lion Gail Gehris, at 6357 Pinecrest Lane, Macungie, PA 18062.

The opening session will be Saturday from 7:45 to 8:45 a.m., when nominees will be named, and PID Brian Sheehan of Minnesota will have a few comments.

Seminars Listed

The second session will be from 10:15 to 11:45 a.m. and include: "Meet the Taters"; "Tricks, Treats and Tips," and Club Success Stories.

Lion Silas Rodenbach and PDG Gehris announced that the displays by vendors will be the same as in the 2016 convention.

Lion Nancy Keller will be the tail twister for the convention luncheon. PDG Joe Chunko is Peace Poster chairman. There are several applicants and there will be three winners with their posters at the luncheon.

Stephen Cunic, who paints pictures that can be touched by the visually impaired, will speak to the Leos.

Lion-Lioness Kathy Dieter with help of Lehigh Twsp. Lionesses will make up baskets. Each club is asked to contribute a basket of goodies, worth \$25.00 or more.

Social hour for the Saturday night banquet (with fruit and cheese tray) will begin at 5:00 p.m. with a cash bar, and dinner will

Candidate Needed, Timely Secretary Reports, Membership Number Stressed at Cabinet

The second Cabinet Meeting of this Lions year in District 14-K was hosted by Region 1 on Saturday morning, November 12 at Friedens United Church of Christ, south of Slatington. The Lions and Lionesses were welcomed by Zone Chairman Joe Sizer.

The business meeting followed the breakfast.

Early on, PDG Linwood Gehris, Global Leadership Team coordinator, noted that training sessions were held in October to assist zone chairpersons in the performance of their duties as well as a primer for those Lions who are looking to become leaders in their club and district. Both he and PDG Advisory Committee chairman Howard Bowers said that so far no one has stepped forward to run for 2nd Vice District Governor in the coming Lions year. This should happen before the next Cabinet meeting in February. Said PDG Lin: "We need to continue our history of having these positions filled, as the training which the per-

son receives is very valuable as they move forward."

As this report was written, Region II, Zone A still had no chairperson, and a meeting was scheduled on November 29 to try to resolve this vacancy. 2nd VDG Karlene Laub said they are hoping to start a Lions club in Northampton, and noted plans for a retreat for members of five years or less. One question that would be posed is "What is the meaning or foundation for a rally?" to possibly boost attendance with a better understanding of what it means to the district.

In her report, Lion Debbie Lillegard, Global Membership Team coordinator, urged showcasing our clubs in this 100th anniversary year. She also noted that there are more than 20 self-directed online courses to promote personal and professional development. While the report listed a net gain of 18 members, actually the number is 14, not 21 as reported to LCI, but still ahead of other districts in Pennsylvania.

Later reports by DG Marsha Johnston, 1st VDG Don Kaufman, 2nd VDG Laub and CC Karen Brady cited problems with secretary reports, and that they need to be turned in on time. Lion Karlene said the district is up 14 members. "We want to brag about it, but not exaggerate the numbers." DG Marsha echoed that sentiment, in that we need to be accurate in our numbers. CC Karen said, "Send reports in on time, so information is the latest. The club secretaries need to send reports to LCI no later than the 15th of the month."

Lion Lillegard said, "Our weakest link is club presidents and secretaries who don't know how to do reports." She offered to help in forwarding the information online.

In addition to the open positions noted, there is a need for a District LEO advisor, a Lioness liaison, a hearing research representative, a chairperson for the Journey

for Sight, and a Beacon Lodge representative.

Lions Centennial

District Centennial Coordinator PDG Glen Santee noted the four centennial challenges - Youth, Vision, Hunger, and Environment - and urged clubs to do a legacy project for their communities in any of those categories.

At the recent district rally, a project was geared to saving our environment when 1,295 batteries of every type were recycled, keeping them from landfills and leaching toxins into our water systems. He said that at our March 25, 2017 district convention, we will look back and plan our future, when a seminar of sharing what our clubs have done through service will be available. At the state convention, participants will pack 20,000 meals in three hours to feed the hungry.

PDG Fred Folland noted that at State Council there was a project suggested that would involve all clubs, "Hot Dogs for Hunger", but no date has been set as yet. Something like that and the Beacon Lodge work weekend noted by Lion Brady would qualify for the "challenge mountains" that International President Robert Corlew has in this centennial year.

Lion Marty Lower, district environmental chairperson, urged all the clubs to report their environmental projects as you do them.

Care & Share

PDG Larry Snyder reported donations from two clubs in the Care & Share program. Alburts Lions have donated 105 lbs. of food to the St. Paul's UCC Trelxertown food pantry and 213 lbs. that wasn't reported last year. The Lehigh Valley Saturday A.M. Lions have donated the equivalent of 450 lbs. to the Salem Methodist Church pantry.

This year's goal is 81,000 lbs. and Lion Larry is hopeful that the goal will be

Beacon Lodge Had Successful Season Despite Personnel Changes

Despite a number of personnel problems, that forced the camp to rely on volunteers, past counselors, and other staff, Pa. Lions Beacon Lodge had a successful 2016 camping season, with 359 campers, including 29 new campers in Adult Camp and 26 new campers in Children's Village. With four off-season rentals, there were 603 campers there in 2016. Ten of the campers came from District 14-K.

Board member PDG Dennis Butz made this report at the recent Cabinet meeting. He also noted the wish list donations that save the camp money, a fall retreat for about 20 visually impaired campers who are completely independent that will be held in October 2017, the 2017 Leo Rally on May 5-7, Project New Hope [due to

low enrollment the camp was only able to have two out of the three scheduled sessions in 2016. Three families with 23 people all plan on returning in 2017]. A golf tournament will be held on August 26. The annual Lions Appreciation Day will be on July 16.

New metal roofs were installed on two buildings in Children's Village. McPhey & Co. did the installation free of charge for a \$2,500 fee for hunting rights on the property. The swimming pool has been drained, cleaned and painted. The air conditioning unit in the Adult Village kitchen needs to be replaced. Two golf carts that are used for transporting campers need to be replaced and the tractor that is used for plowing snow and general maintenance

also needs to be replaced. Money for these purchases will be taken from the timber cutting account.

Lion Dennis said there is a board member vacancy for District 14-K. See DG Marsha if interested.

Also, there are still six benches to sell at \$1,000 each. They will include a nameplate to honor the Lion or club donating them.

The wish list contains about 100 items that can be used for activities, house-keeping, infirmary supplies, maintenance, and the camp office. The donations save Beacon Lodge about \$25,000 each year. All clubs are urged to participate. Donations can be sent by the clubs or by individual Lions and Lionesses. (That list is included on page 4 of this month's Tattle Tailer.)

There will be a special activity for the LEOs. They will be packing 10,000 meals, which will be distributed to various food banks in our area. I proposed this idea at a recent LEO club meeting and found the LEOs to be very enthusiastic about this project. Some of us who attended the Lions Leadership Forum in Nebraska packed 100,000 meals for the needy in Omaha. It was a very rewarding experience.

MJF Honors at Banquet

Instead of a Melvin Jones luncheon, this year the Melvin Jones Fellowships will be presented after the PID's speech at the Saturday night convention banquet.

In a recent letter to the clubs, LCIF Coordinator PDG Joe Chunko said we will need the Lions clubs to act quickly to let him know who they will be honoring with a Melvin Jones Fellowship or a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellowship. He said that it could take 4-6 weeks to receive the materials depending on the number of plaques that have to be made. To pay respectful tribute to the recipients, this info needs to be furnished to PDG Joe so that it can be read when a new MJF or PMJF is recognized: Name of the club; name of the recipient; family information; number of years in Lions; positions held in Lions; other community or church affiliation; reason for the honor. The minibo should be 100 words or less. Lion Joe needs to have the information no later than March 10, 2017.

The MJF program was started in 1973 in honor of Melvin Jones, the founder of Lions Clubs International. It recognizes donations of \$1,000 to LCIF.

New MJF's receive a pin, commemorative plaque, and a letter from the LCIF chairperson. If the donor so

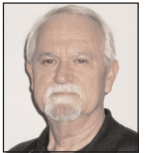

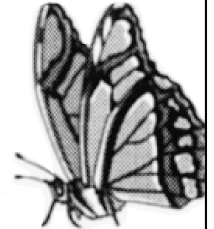

Attention all Lions, Lioness and Leo Clubs of District 14-K:

The Charitable Enterprises Board of Directors voted to cancel the All-Star Soccer Classic after 35 years. The All-Star Soccer Classic was originally started as one of Charitable Enterprises fundraisers. Over the past few years, our profits from this game became smaller and smaller. Here are a few observations:

- Lack of support from many of our Lion and Lioness clubs
- Lack of support from the majority of our 14-K Lion members
- Lack of program booklet sponsors
- Lions not filling the stadium on the day of the game to show support of soccer players

Also, this year we had to cancel the soccer games due to severe weather on June 5th. In order to still honor the soccer players, I sent out emails to all 80 plus soccer players asking them to come to the UCC Church on Airport Road the following Saturday (June 12) to pick up their soccer shirts, certificates and program booklets. Only 30 players and 2 coaches showed up. I again contacted the students and coaches who did not stop by on June 5 via email. Only three parents came to pick up their shirts. PDG Fred Folland and I had to mail two of the soccer players their \$250 Scholarship Checks.

A lot of time, effort and money goes into this fundraiser, but the rewards are small.

The Board of Directors is saddened by this decision. Our goal is to find a replacement fundraiser for the All-Star Soccer Classic. At this time, we ask all our Lions to please support the Charitable Enterprises ½ price (\$15) Lottery Calendar Sales. We currently have 906 Lions. If each Lion would buy or sale one calendar, we could make a profit of over \$13,000.

PDG Joe Chunko
