Emmaus Lions Donate Funds to Buy Police Dog

The Emmaus Lions Club recently donated \$12,200 to purchase and train a new police dog for the K9 program in the Emmaus Police Department.

Named "Ronny", the dog will replace retiring police dog "Zandor", who worked with handler, Officer Craig Blose. Imported from Holland, "Ronny" will work with handler, Officer Vincent Murante. The K9 partners were at the Emmaus Borough Council meeting on Monday, June 20 when Lions club members donated the check and were honored in turn with a proclamation from the Mayor Winfield Iobst for their long-standing support of the K9 program.

The Emmaus Lions Club has supported the police dog program since 1990 and they have raised more than \$70,000 for the project since then. The Lions purchased all seven of the police dogs the department has used since then for such tasks as security and

searching to catch criminals to sniffing out narcotics and finding evidence at crime scenes.

Mayor Iobst thanked the Lions for their "outstanding service to the community of Emmaus."

"Ronny" is a Belgian Malinois, which looks similarly to a German shepherd and, like shepherds, are known to be intelligent and hard working, making them great for police work.

The \$12,200 donation will pay for "Ronny" and 320 hours of training for the K9 team, according to Henry Heil, Emmaus Lions Club committee chairman for drug awareness.



In his report, PDG Larry Snyder, Care & Share chairperson, said the goal this year was 81,000 pounds of items to the Second Harvest Food Bank, and 17,881 pounds came in. The new goal is again 81,000 pounds. Briana McGonigle is the new Second Harvest Development Coordinator, Lion Snyder said.

PDG Tom Dieter gave his final report on the April 2-3 district convention, in which 241 Lions, Lionesses, Leos and guests attended. The committee thanked all the clubs for donating baskets to the luncheon drawing. The 2017 convention will be earlier, on March 25 and 26. The keynote speaker will be P.I.D. Brian Sheehan of Bird Island, Minnesota.

Lion Paul Bealer thanked the Lions and their clubs who supported him in the Peace Poster Contests, from sponsoring a contest, to making the contest certificates, to offering cash prizes, to publicizing winners. He suggested that clubs order their peace poster kits now from Lions Clubs International before they are sold out. Although he is stepping down, he encouraged all clubs to continue holding local contests.

PDG Linwood Gehris reported that the Lions of Pennsylvania Foundation approved four of seven grant requests of \$2,000 each for eye screeners from Districts A, L, N, and U. Another request from the Western Pa. Lions Hearing Foundation for \$6,000 was


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Leos In Action
