Reliable transportation to screening sites is necessary. Fluency in Spanish would be helpful.

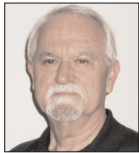

LCIF Chairman Tells Where Money Has Gone in Past

LCIF chairman PDG Joe Chunko, at the recent Cabinet meeting, reported how LCIF has fulfilled its mission in serving communities locally and globally, giving hope and impacting lives through humanitarian service projects and grants.

In fiscal year 2015-2016, Lions, their partners and friends generously donated \$39.48 million to LCIF. The Foundation awarded 453 grants totaling more than \$45.2 million.

Here are the LCIF Core Objectives and the Investment & Impact for each:

- Improving local communities - \$13,874,392 to improve education health care and other critical public services for 3,994,860 people.
- Supporting Youth - \$1,437,287 to implement and expand Lions Quest in 19 countries.
- Providing Disaster Relief - \$9,480,060 to support Lions and other partners as they provided aid to approximately 500,000 victims.
- Combating Measles - \$7,965,350 to support the vaccination of 17,400,000 children through the Measles and Rubella Initiative and Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance.
- Saving Sight - \$12,994,255 to deliver eye care services, improve 51 eye care facilities and train 23,643 eye care professionals, benefiting 22,300,000 people.

Adult Campers Arrive at Beacon Lodge, Children Enrollment Is Lower

The 2017 camping season at Beacon Lodge is underway with the first adult campers arriving on June 3rd. There are approximately 300 campers enrolled for the eight sessions of camp. Enrollment for the children's camping sessions remains low. Project New Hope, which is a camping session for Disabled Veterans and their families, has 10 families enrolled for their session beginning on July 31st. Thank you to all of the clubs or individuals who provided camper sponsorships for this year's camping season. Camping sponsorships of any kind are still available and are always welcome.

New this year is an opportunity to sponsor a camp counselor. A donation of \$250 sponsors one counselor for one camping session.

PDG Dennis Butz, who is a Beacon Lodge board

member from District 14-K, said, "Thank you to any club or individual who donated in any way toward the Camp Wish List." Donations are accepted at any time during the year. The wish list donations go a long way in helping to keep the camp expenses down. Last year's wish list donations saved the camp approximately \$25,000.

There is a need to replace 10 benches at the camp. Repairs were attempted on some of the older benches, but they are beyond repair. Benches can be replaced for a \$1,000 donation and will be personalized in memory of someone or your club or district, says PDG Butz.

Since Beacon Lodge no longer receives state funding and the United Way funding has been reduced drastically, the camp is trying to cut costs as much as

Approximately 35% of the 1,000 calendar cards were sold.

From July 1, 2016 through June 7, 2017 there have been 94 payouts - totaling \$4,250.00. The average number of payouts per month is 7.8. (Approximately 25.6% per year)

Calendar cards for the 2017-2018 year have been distributed to Lions and Lioness club secretaries via mail or hand delivered. The success of the sales is dependant on club secretaries encouraging Lion and Lioness members to sell and/or purchase the cards repetitively at their meetings.

Renewal letters have been sent to all current calendar patrons - to date 186 cards have been purchased. Many customers are waiting to be asked by their favorite Lion or Lioness. We simply cannot be successful without Club Member support.

"Thank you to the clubs who have responded with their support! Can we depend on your support to **Serve** those in need? After all, isn't this **what Lions do?**" said Lion David G. Fatzinger, who has charge of the lottery calendar cards.
