Scout to Build First Sensory Trail for Blind and Impaired

(From a May 14 article in the Express-Times) The Lehigh Business Group, Valley partnered Wildlands with the Conservancy, Center for Vision Loss, Plantique, Cedar Crest College, are supporting Devin Garcia, a member of Boy Scout Troop 43 in Bath, who plans to work on the Lehigh Valley's first Sensory Trail for the blind and visually impaired.

Garcia hopes to obtain the rank of Eagle Scout by helping to build the Sensory Trail as his project. "My Goal is to help build a safe place to explore nature for people who are visually impaired," Garcia said.

The five-mile self-guided, post-and-rope trail for the blind and visually impaired will be celebrated on June 27 at Pool Wildlife Sanctuary in Emmaus.

The walking trail will be situated in an area known as the "Urban Forest," accessible from Farr Road and adjacent to Cedar Crest Boulevard.

"Creation of the Sensory Trail will build lasting connec-tions to nature for the blind and visually impaired residents throughout the region," says Chris Kocher, president

of the Wildlands Conser-vancy. "The Sensory Trail complements our existing pro-grams centered on land pro-tection, stewardship and outdoor education."

Doug Yingling, Executive Director of the Center for Vision Loss, said, "The Center vision Loss, said, The center is thrilled to play a role in designing a walking trail that is accessible to people who are blind or visually impaired."

He adds: "We will pro-mote it as a destination for our group activities.

Services and programs for blind and visually impaired residents of Lehigh and Northampton counties began in 1928. In that year, Helen Keller, the inspirational deaf and blind teacher, spoke at Liberty High School in Bethlehem. She asked members of the audience who were Lions members to join her crusade against blindness by becoming "Knights of the Blind."

It was then that the Lions clubs in this area founded the Northampton and Lehigh Counties Associations for the Blind. Three years ago they merged to become the Center for Vision Loss.


