The new website branding is "Northeast PA Lions Eye Bank/Sight Life". The purpose of this organization is to wipe out corneal blindness both in the United States and abroad.

The board of directors was scheduled to meet to formalize the new foundation "Northeast PA Lions Service Foundation". The 4.7 million dollars that was transferred is currently in a holding account, soon to be moved to a "managed account" where the grant process system can begin by the next Lions year.
