

# Membership Reported Down at February Cabinet Meeting

It wasn't much, but overall, membership is down in Lions District 14-K when reports were given by the Region Chairs at the February 18 Cabinet meeting. The total on Oct. 31, 2016 was 906 Lions and at the latest meeting, the number was at 892, minus 14. Region III suffered the greatest loss, 12.

Once again, the "Ask 1" effort was stressed as a way of building the figure upward again. (See another report below from Global Membership chair Debbie Lillegard.)

Many other committee reports were given at the

breakfast meeting at the Bethlehem Township Community Center. Lions Mary Neher and Kathy Fenstermacher of Region II were the hosts.

Proposed changes to the Charitable Enterprises By-Laws, which were sent to all Lions in the district, were approved at the meeting.

PDG Larry Snyder reported that 24,771 lbs. of food have been donated for the Second Harvest Food Bank in a goal of 81,000 lbs. for the year. In dollar amounts, it is \$6,247.67 that needs to be raised.

#### Necrology Breakfast



I suggest when you advertise your next fundraiser that you also advertise that you need help. Put 'Volunteer Help Wanted" on the event flyer. Encourage people to call, sign-up and get involved in all the great things we do as Lions.

We are very fortunate to never have had such issues in our District, but this certainly was an eye opener for me. Lions Clubs International is also very fortunate to have such exemplary Lions working for the good of Lionism. I suppose the moral of the story is that when we think something doesn't make sense or it seems like a downright dumb idea, ask questions instead of criticizing. There may be a good reason behind it.



# Youth Leadership Forum At Camp Victory in April

The cost to sponsor one student is \$125, covering 2 nights lodging, 5 meals plus snacks throughout the day and evening activities and, of course, for us, transportation to the camp back and forth. PDG Fred said that a form for each club sponsoring one or more students needs to be filled out and the check enclosed, and sent to him by a deadline of April 10.

The teens will have an opportunity to hear professionals relate to them the decision making process needed throughout high school. This process will lead them into adulthood and help to mold their futures, Folland said.

The students will come from Pike, Carbon, Lycoming, Monroe, Montour, Lehigh, Northampton, Schuylkill, Snyder, Sullivan, Tioga and Union counties. The student doesn't have to be affiliated with a Leo club or a relative of a Lions member to attend.

It is a drug, alcohol and tobacco-free weekend. Students bring their own
