Talk, Pack 400 Boxes of Cookies

Twenty-eight Leos were at the 30th annual District 14-K convention. They heard a very meaningful talk by a young man afflicted with disease who has always maintained a positive attitude; they packed hundreds of boxes of cookies, and they attended the model luncheon.

Speaking to the boys and girls from several of the Leo clubs in the district was Shane Burcaw, 22, who, despite his spinal muscular atrophy, has learned to live with the disease and found a way to laugh.

He said, "The world needs positive people like you, the Leos," and in turn it was pointed out that they help people with such projects as Relay for Life, having a duck race that raised \$10,000, and wrapped gifts at Christmas time, among many other projects.

Burcaw said he was 12 months old when he was taken to Children's Hospital in Philadelphia, where he was diagnosed. He decided to go on with his life and not let it hold him back, and that he would look at his disease in a positive way.

His cousin Sarah told the young people all that was going on, and that Shane's family decided they would make it work out. They played games and at 2-1/2 Shane was a part of it.

A wheelchair and chair lift gave him confidence. When he could talk and use a laptop he found interaction with other people. "When you see people who are disabled, you talk to them," he said.

Shane could have sat in his room and pouted, he said, but he allowed himself to accept what he is and made the best of it, and he's happy. He has communicated on computer and has had a blog from Brazil. Shane remarked that he wants to help people live happier lives, and has established a non-profit that helps people have a positive experience in life.

He has had a few articles published in the Morning Call, and has written a book enti-




New Jersey Eyeglass Recycling Center truck driver and Lion Ray Klein stand next to the truck loaded 20,836 used eyeglasses.
