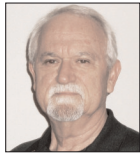

District Governor's Message

Your Club, Your Way



It's a Great Time to be a Lion, Leo and Lioness!
As I visit clubs in District 14-K with our 1st VDG Karlene Laub, we try to focus our talks around membership, leadership, fundraisers, and club well-being.

The last one, club well-being, is one of the most important. A club cannot perform at its best when things are not running smoothly.

In order to improve the health of your club you must first maintain your membership and plan to add new members. Maintaining membership may be easier than you think. There is an LCI publication called "Your Club, Your Way" found on the LCI website. You can do a search for DA-YCYW and download a copy.

One area found in the publication "Your Club, Your Way" includes how you can customize your club meetings to have the right fellowship and atmosphere. Your meetings should be designed to appeal to your members and prospective members who want to make a difference in your community. You have a choice . . . your club has the freedom to structure your club meetings in a way that best meets your member needs.

Reinventing your general meeting may involve some of the following ideas:

- Frequency of meetings . . . some clubs meet once a week, while others once a month.
- Established date and time for the meeting . . . should the gathering have a set date and time or be flexible based on service activities.
- Determine meals and location . . . It is a long-standing tradition to include a meal during your meeting - but it's not a requirement and often lengthens the meeting and adds to the cost of membership.
- Question traditions . . . Many clubs open with a song or a pledge, but your club does not have to! Determine the traditions that your members would like to keep and drop the others.
- Examine protocol . . . Your club has the authority to continue or eliminate items such as a head table for club leaders and visitors, acknowledging members in order of rank. Some clubs prefer an atmosphere where everyone is on an equal level with one another.

Just remember to phase change in slowly and make sure your members have agreed to the changes.

amounting to \$53,000. Participating clubs received a thank-you card containing a patch which can be displayed on club flags. A goal of \$53,000 has also been set for 2017-2018 and by the end of the breakfast, \$43,000 had been raised through club pledges and gifts.

A highlight of the event was the premier of a video produced by ASR Media Productions, which focused on how our agency has impacted the life of Dorothy, one of our clients. The video can be viewed at www.centerforvisionloss.org. Doug and various staff then shared agency program successes including braille classes, the

Community Service Project to benefit Animals in Distress as part of CVL's Camp I CAN! Curriculum and the development of a new community outreach program about eye health and vision loss which targets Spanish-speaking members of our community.

• **Financial**

1. Consider digital meetings (conference calls) for Multiple District leaders instead of face to face meetings to decrease cost of committee travel.
2. Provide education for better understanding of district budget by executive committee.
3. Review budget line items to decrease expenses as they relate to set items within policy.
