Vision Walk Sept. 26 Aids in Fighting Retinal Eye Disease

Lion Kathy Fenstermacher, a member of the Saucon Valley Lions Club, was authorized at the recent cabinet meeting to seek support from Lions clubs in District 14-K about the upcoming Lehigh Valley Vision Walk, sponsored by the Foundation Fighting Blindness.

It will be held on urday, Sept. 26 at Saturday, Sept. 26 at ArtsQuest Steel Stacks campus in Bethlehem starting at 9 a.m.

Mrs. Fenstermacher became affiliated with the foundation as the result of her son Charles' eye disease, a type of junior macular degeneration.

The foundation was established in 1971 by a passionate group of individuals driven to overcome visionrobbing retinal degenerative diseases that were affecting themselves and loved ones. Their goal: To drive the research that would lead to preventions, treatments and cures for the entire spectrum of blinding retinal diseases including macular degeneration, retinitis pigmentosa, and Usher syndrome.

Over the past four decades, the Foundation, with 50 volunteer-led chapters across the U.S., have

raised more than \$500 million to put an end to retinal degenerative diseases.

Mrs. Fenstermacher said, "In order to help find a cure we assist in raising_money for the Foundation Fighting Blindness. This helps me deal with the situation as we have no control on how this progresses for Charles. He ed from high school. He has faith that a cure is coming. There are clinical trials underway, but we really have no idea when they will be approved for more patients

accordance with Pennsylvania law, after legal notice was provided to the membership, 82 Lions registered at the Wednesday, August 19 Lions membership meeting at the Best Western Premier, 800 East Park Drive in Harrisburg for Harrisburg for Pennsylvania Lions Eye Bank, Inc. A quorum was established.

The membership (Lions members of Districts H, W, G, U, K, L, T, C & D) met and voted by secret ballot. The vote was overwhelming in favor (only 13 "no" votes) of moving forward consistent with the Plan of Asset Transfer of the Northeast Pennsylvania Lions Eye Bank, Inc. to SightLife, which had been approved by the Board of Directors.

The next steps are to have a formal contract signed between SightLife and the Eye Bank and then pursue and obtain approval from the Attorney General of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and the Court of Ćommon Pleas of Northampton County.
