

# First Cabinet Meeting New Lions Club Organized Challenges Lions Clubs In Center City, Allentown

A new year in Lionism reflected the challenges and also ways to deal with them as Lions and Lionesses met in the first Cabinet meeting at the Brass Rail restaurant in Allentown on Saturday, August 19, hosted by Region 1. District Governor Don Kaufman says "Every Member Matters" and that they possess unique talents that make our District 14-K clubs great because of their dedication to serving people in their communities.

After breakfast, the business meeting included introduction of a special guest from District 14-U, P.I.D. Bob Miller. Then came approval of the 2017-18 budget by the executive committee and reports from the Global Leadership, Membership, and Service

Team coordinators, fol-lowed by reports of DG Kaufman, 1st VDG Karlene Laub, and zone chairpersons, and district committee chairs.

### **Team Coordinators**

PDG Dennis Butz, coordinator for leadership, noted the need for a 2nd VDG, and invited Lions to join the team. "Take a look around your clubs and identify those Lions who possess the leadership characteristics of confidence, caring, compassion, integrity, open mindedness, ethical and committed to Lions."

IPCC Karen Brady, on membership, noted the ups and downs and said every new member we bring in to the pride will affect the **Continued on Page 2**

With the former Allentown Lions Club dissolving in the past year, District Governor Marsha Johnston, and 1st Vice District Governor Don Kaufman, along with other members of District 14-K, saw a need to replace that club and two others from Bethlehem. 

LCIF chairman PDG Joe Chunko, at a recent Cabinet meeting, reported how LCIF has fulfilled its mission in serving communities locally and globally, giving hope and impacting lives through humanitarian service projects and grants.

In fiscal year 2015-2016, Lions, their partners and friends generously donated \$39.48 million to LCIF. The Foundation awarded 453 grants totaling more than \$45.2 million.

Here are the LCIF Core Objectives and the Investment & Impact for each:

• Improving local communities - \$13,874,392 to improve education health care and other critical public services for 3,994,860 people.

• Supporting Youth - \$1,437,287 to implement and expand Lions Quest in 19 countries.

• Providing Disaster Relief - \$9480,060 to support Lions and other partners as they provided aid to approximately 500,000 victims.

• Combating Measles - \$7,965,350 to support the vaccination of 17,400,000 children through the Measles and Rubella Initiative and Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance.

• Saving Sight - \$12,994,255 to deliver eye care services, improve 51 eye care facilities and train 23,643 eye care professionals, benefiting 22,300,000 people.


